OUR LAST MEETING

Peter Arnett, Marrickville Council Chief Town Planner, informed us of Council plans to house and open its Archives, which he pointed out were one of the best collections outside the City of Sydney. Council, he added, had applied for a major grant from the Bicentennial Authority which would enable the Archives to be sorted, housed, microfilmed (where appropriate) and made more accessible to the public.

Some of the material from the Archives, now housed in various Town Hall rooms, attics and basements, was exhibited to provide some idea of the wide range of material included in the collection. This included information not only on the comings and goings of various civic dignitaries (minute books, letter books, and so forth) but also extensive input from local residents who wrote in (as they still do) with all manner of complaints; then there were records of societies, such as the Marrickville Municipal Orchestra which was prominent in the 1930s. There were unusual items such as an earth closet book of the 1870s, which registered regular charges for removal of night soil. Another interesting item was a dairy book which listed dairies in operation. their size, the numbers of cows and horses. Council also has a fair collection of dedications which provide interesting information, and posters about how estates were divided up in the late nineteenth century. For those exploring the history of their house and street the extensive collection of rate books are invaluable. They provide more reliable and detailed information about houses than you will find in Sand's Directories; listing the owner and tenant of each property and its assessment; sometimes there are even comments on the type of house.

We've come a long way since our first meeting on 28 April 1984 and our first Newsletter, June '84, which listed the eighteen founding members. We've now grown to 89 persons and many others read our regular literature. In 1984 we produced six editions of the Newsletter. Our Journal, Heritage, which appeared in December, was well received and is selling very well.

During 1984 we've been able to establish very good working relations with Marrickville Council and have begun to establish links with community groups and institutions in the area. This month, for instance, we welcome Newington College as a member of the Society.

All this expansion has only occurred, I believe, because the Society has struck a popular chord in Marrickville and will expand even further in 1985. It's hard to point to precise reasons because those involved in our society are a very diverse bunch of individuals. Some have a special interest in houses and even bricks; some are keen to pursue ancestors; some are researching pottery and industry; some are looking into railways and communications; some are long-term residents whereas others have come recently to the area. The one thing they appear to have in common is a keen interest in our area, and its rich and varied traditions, and an interest in communicating that interest.

The Society has embarked on a much more ambitious programme for 1985. The nine regular Saturday meetings will provide a varied programme of talks, discussions and outings. They will be supplemented by three to four quarterly meetings for those who find Saturday awkward. Then in April we will embark on a special and unique Heritage Week programme. The second issue of the Heritage will appear in December. So, why not join us?
