POT LUCK CHRISTMAS DINNER SATUDAY DECEMBER 11, 7PM



OUR LAST MEETING TEDDY THE JAM MAN

Chris Pratten spoke on his grandfather. As a rule other people's families is not a rivetting subject - but with Chris bringing in places, events, buildings in our locality, he wove a very entertaining story around H.E. Pratten's life and times. Born in Bristol, England in 1856, he emigrated to Austalia to work for Lysaghts at Five Dock. However, that was short lived and he left to start a cordial factory. This was the start of a most prodigious career - manufacturer, alderman and mayor of Ashfield and finally a member of Federal Parliament.

Because of the huge amount of information gathered on different periods of Pratten's life, Chris has produced three monographs: "The Ashfield Cordial Works", "The Mayor of Ashfield" and "Mullet in Tomato Sauce, the Story of Maclean Cannery ". Six more are in preparation and one of these concerns the jam factory in Stanmore. One was left wanting to hear more stories of Teddy the Jam Man. - Shirley Hilyard.

#### OBITUARY - IMELDA STUART

It is with sadness we record the death of Imelda Stuart, who only recently joined the Marrickville Heritage Society. Imelda was particularly known in Stanmore where she lived, for in 1977 with Samantha Cole, another new member, she convened a public meeting in St Augustine's Church Hall, Albany Rd, Stanmore, and the Stanmore Society was formed. This residents group successfully lobbied Marrickville Council over the years on local issues of parks and gardens and rebuilding the Stanmore Library after it was destroyed by fire. Most of the streets of Stanmore were photographed as a valuable resource. Imelda came on the Society's Day in the Hunter Valley in May. Some of us knew of her enthusiasm and spirit. We joined her family at St Michael's on Weekley Park, Stanmore, in a celebration of her life and it is to her family and many friends we offer our condolences. - Shirley Hilyard.

WE WENT TO GOULBURN IN LILAC TIME.
The RAHS Annual Conference with
Affiliated Societies was held in Goulburn
9-10 October at the Police Academy. The
Society was represented by Jeannette
Hope and Shirley Hilyard although other
members of MHS attended in other
capacities.

Shirley accepted a cheque for \$350 for a cultural grant we had applied for to use in publishing our journal Heritage.

The conference is a chance to hear of the latest research and exchange ideas. Guest speaker at the Conference Dinner ( where our own Geoff Ostling was Master of Ceremonies) Dr Richard Reid, historian of the Australian War Memorial, told of the undertaking of bringing back to Canberra an Unknown Soldier from the Western Front 1914-18.

Excellent papers were given on the theme Giving History the Justice It Deserves. After the conference we toured Goulburn and saw some of its architectural gems: The Court House and Post Office both by James Barnet, two cathedrals and St Clair, now the home of Goulburn & District Historical Society.




HOW TO JOIN THE SOCIETY

THE BELLS OF ST CLEMENT'S

Our Christmas illustration on the front page is from the St Clement's Parish Notes dated November 1, 1921. At the time the St Clement's parishioners were raising funds to finance the purchase of bells for the Marrickville Road church. A monster fete and sale of work was to be held in the School Hall with opening ceremony by Her Excellency Dame Margaret Davidson.

"The bells are being cast by the renowned bell-founders, Messrs John Taylor & Co. England - they are to be here early in the New Year. The cost of the Bells will be £750, " reports the Parish Notes. "There only needs to be a strong effort of the people of Marrickville and this amount will be raised. Talk about the Fete and Sale , come to it and get others to come. The ladies at the various stalls are preparing things in abundance - things you want. You will get your money's worth, and at the same time adding to Marrickville's a grant(sic) Peal of Bells, which will help to voice our feelings on great occasions. For instance, how the bells chiming forth their melody on the day when the news came of the end of the War would have added to our jubilation."
