TRADITIONAL INN NAMES IN MARRICKVILLE


Most of the old hotels in the Marrickville Municipality have English names. This is despite the fact that a large proportion of the settlers here were from other parts of the British Isles and from other parts of the world, and that innkeeping here was a favourite occupation of the Irish!


THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH, 148 ENMORE RD, ENMORE

The custom of naming a hotel after an English aristocrat also originated in the Middle Ages. The Medieval inns operated under the patronage of their feudal lord. They were often named after him, or after his coat of arms.

THE GOLDEN BARLEY, 167 EDGEWARE RD, MARRICKVILLE

A traditional inn name, derived from preindustrial times, when the innkeeper often tended his own barley fields and the innkeeper's wife brewed the beer for her guests. There are a number of traditional English inn names which refer to barley or the brewing process.





THE CARLISLE CASTLE, 19 ALBERMARLE ST, NEWTOWN.

In the Middle Ages in Britain, under the Feudal System, the lord had certain obligations towards the common people, in return for their vassalage toward him. One of the lord's duties was to provide accommodation for travellers at his castle. Gradually inns were established around Medieval castles, to provide accommodation for the overflow of travellers. These inns took their name from their local castle, and the custom of naming an inn after an appropriate castle has continued into modern times.

THE WHITE HORSE, 161 PRINCES HWY, ST PETERS

In former times, widespread illiteracy among the British population made it convenient for a hostelry to have a name which could be visually depicted on the inn sign which hung above its front door. Then a traveller could identify an inn by the image on the sign.

THE ROYAL EXCHANGE, 205 MARRICKVILLE RD, MARRICKVILLE

This was a fairly common inn name of old London, and it was introduced widely into this country during the 19th century. The name may have become popular from the money changing services which were provided by the old London inns. - Barbara Gibbons.

FUNDING FOR LOCAL HERITAGE PROJECTS - OLD TOWN HALL

The Jessie Street Library Association is among the 1993 recipients of funding for heritage projects. The assocation has received \$30,000 for the rehabilitation of the former Marrickville Town Hall for use as its headquarters. It was one of 254 heritage projects granted a total of \$2.7 million in funding in NSW following recommendations by the Heritage Council. Other local projects to receive funding include \$50,000 each year for two years to Newtown Anglican Parish for restoration of St Stephens Anglican Church Newtown and \$2000 and \$45,000 next year to Marrickville Uniting Church Parish for restoration of Marrickville Uniting Church pipe organ.

The funds will also help conserve Aboriginal sites, publicly and privately owned buildings, natural areas, a ferry, churches, cemeteries and industrial heritage landmarks. Nearly one third of the funding has been allocated to heritage education and promotion projects. The Royal Australian Historical Society will receive \$44,000 for its small grants program for archive and local history projects.
