THE BATTLE FOR STEEL PARK

Full marks to Marrickville Councillors for unanimously rejecting the application to develop a large part of Steel Park, Marrickville into a major sporting complex. It was a tremendous victory for the local residents who in the space of a few weeks mobilised an extraordinary campaign involving consolidated networking, rallies and about 2000 letter box drops opposing the David Lloyd Leisure Australia proposal.

A working party will be formed involving Councillors, Council staff and community representatives to develop options for community, cultural and sporting use of the area and a survey will be conducted on recreational needs.

Mart Tait, who died on 8 May at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital from leukaemia, had lived all her life in Malakoff Street, Marrickville.

Members of MHS attended a service of thanksgiving for her life at the Northern Suburbs Crematorium.

Others will write of her work in the community – of her remedial reading with children of Marrickville West Primary School and as a volunteer at Eversleigh Palliative Care Unit. For this Mary was honoured as a Rotary Club Citizen of the Year in 1991.

9 MIDDLETON STREET STANMORE


Members may be interested to know some details about an 1881 two storey building at 9 Middleton Street, Stanmore, which appears to be divided into units. Externally it is well preserved and easily recognised from the original finely detailed plans.

The contract for the construction of this *villa residence*, describes its situation as being at *the rear of the new Wesleyan College* (Newington). The architect was Edmund Cooper Manfred of Goulburn. The builder was James Welsby of Goodlet and Cleveland Streets, Sydney and the owner Thomas Felton, then of Liverpool.

The agreement was entered into on 24 December 1880, for the cost of 1175 pounds: The whole of the works to be completed within five months, subject to a three pound a week forfeit if in excess of that time.

E.C. Manfred (1856-1941) was a prominent Goulburn and southern district architect. As a junior he was professionally associated with the *great ecclesiastical and former Colonial architect E.T. Blacket*. In 1879 he went to Goulburn with the illustrious Blackets to work on St Saviour's Cathedral and decided to stay there.

Manfred's work included a church, hotel, hospital, Goulburn City Hall, and many prominent town and country residences; even extending as far afield as Stanmore! Furthermore, his second wife Eleanor Bugle came from Stanmore.

TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES – TEMPE DOG TRACK

Members may recall the articles on Munro's Dog Oval which was east of the Princes Highway about midway between Canal Road and the goods railway line in St Peters (see February & April 1996 newsletters). Council Archivist Cheri Lutz has located correspondence which adds to this story.

In March 1938 Alex Wennerborn of 32 Edith Street, St Peters wrote to St Peters Council in his capacity as Secretary, Munro Park Greyhound Racing Club Ltd. seeking approval for a **second** greyhound racing license to conduct dog races on the property now known as Munro's Sports Ground.

In May 1939 E.L. Stephens of Five Dock wrote to St Peters Council about having a separate dog trialling track up to the latest Electric Standards and conforming with size to the latest track to be licensed. In June he applied to have the track located on the property owned by Mr Robinson between South Street and Swamp Road, Tempe. He assured the Town Clerk that no breach of the laws and regulations, that would tend to cause any disfavour to either the Council or Police will be tolerated at any time.

This application was obviously successful. In March 1940 two Wentworth Street, Tempe residents wrote complaining of the terrible noise at the end of Wentworth Street caused by the barking and howling of dogs, people shouting, bad language, car doors slamming and the noise of the engine running the hare, all making it unbearable to live there. So much for the applicant's assurances! This was happening every day from 5.30 am and plans were under way to light the course for night use. The residents wondered why a second dog track was needed when Munro's Dog Oval in St Peters was nearby. It is not clear how long the Tempe track lasted but MHS member Ron Smith recalls the Tempe dog track going well into the 1940s. Both Munro's & Tempe tracks are long since (dog)gone!

OUR LAST MEETING BELGENNY FARM & CAMDEN PARK

Despite the forecast of rain, the sun shone on us for our delightful visit on 24 May to *Belgenny Farm*, Camden and *Camden Park*, Menangle built by John and Elizabeth Macarthur. At Belgenny Farm a delicious morning tea served in the old granary was followed by a display of sheep dogs working with descendants of the original Macarthur flock. The buildings, close to Belgenny Cottage (designed by Greenway's rival Henry Kitchen) reveal the diversity of the farm.

The layout is impressive – mill, granary, engine room, sheepshed, slaughterhouse, piggery, carpenter's shop and blacksmith's shop with its enormous bellows, all close together. Great consideration was given to the stables with horses on one side; bays for drays, sleds and other horse drawn vehicles on the other. The buildings are of a high quality and have weathered remarkably well. With the slight permeation of farm odours remaining, we could imagine ourselves back in what must have been a model working farm developed on the time and motion principle lines. The Elizabeth Macarthur Agricultural Institute has developed the farm as an educational centre showing all facets of early farming and presenting the cultural, social and economic aspects of colonial times.

After a visit to the Macarthur family cemetery we reached Camden Park, built 1831-35 and continuously occupied by members of the Macarthur family since. Elegant in the Regency style with pavilions on either side of a central two-storeyed block with entire front colonnaded, local Hawkesbury sandstone was used extensively and the stuccoed brick exterior gives a pleasant appearance. Situated on a rise we lunched in the gardens (amid the roses and the first camellia Camden Park grown here) with a wonderful panorama of the surrounding area.

The house (in which parts of My Brilliant Career was filmed) reveals a smorgasbord of treasure – paintings, books, furniture, whale oil lamps, an early Macarthur dinner service and old appliances in the original kitchen. The cellars contain remnants of wine from the old vineyard.

We enjoyed the privilege of seeing these two properties which are a complete contrast and have been so caringly retained. Special thanks to *The Friends of Belgenny* guides Michael, Noel and Sylvia; sheepdogs Ruby and Knucklehead ('Ed for short), and their wrangler; our hosts and guides at Camden Park, John and Edwina Macarthur-Stanham; and to Shirley Hilyard for organising this wonderful day.

SHIRLEY'S CAMDEN PARK POSTSCRIPT: Guided through the house we marvelled at the interiors – the entrance hall, dining room, and the library all relying on elegant proportions, superb joinery on classical lines, vistas along passages, portraits and fine Australian furniture. With one omission – three architects in our group could have pointed out some of the elements of the exterior that mark Camden Park as a Colonial Regency house, however time passed all too quickly. We will have to go to Menangle again! The annual Open Weekend is 20-21 September (Saturday 12-4, Sunday 10-4; adults \$8, family \$25).

GOODBYE GOLDENIA!

Among our disappearing heritage, once so commonplace, is painted wall advertising. On the last day of autumn the new owner of the 1920s shop on the corner of Unwins Bridge Road and Collins Street, Tempe painted over the old Goldenia Tea sign (blue lettering, orange background), a longtime local landmark (pictured below).



This was despite efforts by MHS member Geoff Croft who had urged the owner not to proceed with painting over the sign. Geoff pointed out the heritage significance of the sign, and the property enhancement value to the building, especially as the owner (ironically) runs a signwriting business! Council advised that they have no authority to prevent obliteration of such painted signage – surely a policy that should be reviewed. A sign of the times: scant respect for the signs of yesteryear!

OLD TOWN HALL VINTAGE SEATS

Pictured below is one of two old wooden seats long domiciled in the Marrickville Town Hall cloakrooms. Our president, the ever vigilant John Zinsmeester, who spotted them some time ago, believes they could date from the 1880s and are remnants from the old Marrickville Town Hall in Illawarra Road which ceased to have that function when the current town hall opened in 1922. It is believed Council's Local Studies Collection has a photograph depicting the seats at the old town hall. The seats have turned front legs and a slatted seat and the back has a pierced decorative pattern.

I have not been privy to a visit to the Ladies cloakroom at the town hall, but a lady member assures me that the pair are identical. Perhaps these fascinating pieces of Council furniture originally stood together in an atmosphere of greater nobility, but their ignominious relegation to the cloakrooms has ironically assured their preservation. They are possibly the only remaining artefacts from that municipal era and should be considered as items of movable heritage in the forthcoming Heritage Study Review.

It appears the NSW Heritage Council will begin proceedings for wilful neglect against Nick Scali, owner of the historic Canterbury Sugar Works. A petition to preserve the mill has been circulating.
