PLACES OF MEMORY: sydney home movies With Virginia Hilyard Petersham Town Hall Saturday 24 April 10.30 am

Places of Memory is a permanent installation at the Museum of Sydney on the site of first Government House. Using home and amateur movie footage from 1929-1996 it charts a living memory of Sydney's people, places and spaces.

Directed by **Virginia Hilyard**, film maker and visual artist, it is a unique collaboration between the Museum of Sydney (MOS) and the National Film and Sound Archive. Virginia will tell of her role in researching and compiling the final selection from over 50 hours of viewed home movies.

She will screen a selection of the footage that will jog our collective memories – the city and the suburbs, picnics and the beach, ferries and the first royal visit. It is a timely look back at Sydney as we approach the end of the century.

"And if you usually avoid home movies, stop right there. This colourful assembly of footage is a revelation" (SMH 22 February 1997). Thanks to MOS for permission to screen excerpts from *Places of Memory*.

During the first year Anne Cherry replaced Judy Mackinolty as treasurer and Bob Thompson replaced Geoff Solomon. The Constitution was adopted at the 26 May meeting.

Several current members joined the Society at or soon after its inception, month of joining in brackets. Edna Andrews (June), Peter Arnett (May), Terry & Maree Blanchard (June), Anne Carolan (May), Richard Cashman (May), Anne Cherry (May), Mary Harte (June), Peter Mabey (May) Judy & John Mackinolty (May), Chrys Meader (May), Tom Pavlakis (June), Laurel Richardson now Horton (May), Verona Rothwell (May), Eve Sharpe (June), Margaret & John Shaw (June), Bob Thompson (June), Ian Tyrrell (May).

Previously there existed the Marrickville Historical Society which began in 1962 and some of whose members were active in the early days of Marrickville Heritage Society. OUR LAST MEETING EVELEIGH LOCOMOTIVE WORKSHOP

On Saturday 20 March over 40 members visited the Eveleigh Locomotive Workshop at Australian Technology Park, Redfern whose heritage conservator David McBeath gave an informative tour of the old methods used in making and maintaining "puffing billies" and their carriages. Eveleigh – once a lovely old home on the western side of the railway line – gave its name to the railway station later renamed Redfern and to the workshops which date from 1880.

In the blacksmith's shop we admired the monster press which shaped red hot billets of steel into the required shapes. The furnace and boilers produced a hot, noisy and dirty atmosphere. Although they had moveable overhead cranes, a large workforce used a variety of hand tools, metalworking lathes, planers, drilling and milling machines. (Men had to have muscles in those days.)

These machines were once state of the art – some heavy machinery was moved into position on blocks of ice – and machine operators had to be highly skilled. "Foreign orders" were commonly processed – there was a big production of baby carriages! Unions were powerful but working conditions were strict. Toilet stops were limited to three a day; you got a "ticket of leave" and were timed

Building No. 2 revealed a stunning renovation incorporating overhead cranes still on the rails. It is currently used by Conservatorium of Music students and is available for conferences, lectures and functions. Back outside David pointed out the wartime bomb shelters under the railway line and the tent housing a worm farm of some three million inhabitants happily munching away in the cause of ecological science (I did not count them and could not hear them).

We inspected steam locomotive 3801 (designed and built in NSW) recently restored by volunteers to look shiny, majestic and powerful. It does the Cockatoo run to Robertson and elsewhere.

David showed a video of the final day of Eveleigh Workshop operations in 1987. However Technology Park is being used for a range of new technologies (eg Australia's first fuel cell). Thank you David for this wonderful tour (illuminating for both lay people and technology buffs) which will be conducted again during Heritage Week.

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HERITAGE WATCH

- * The Society has lodged a submission to Marrickville Council opposing an application to demolish the residence at **94 Brighton Street Petersham** (on the corner of Wentworth Street). The proposed three storey boarding house with 27 rooms is out of scale and does not relate to its setting.
- * A row of shops on the **corner of Byrnes Street & Illawarra Road Marrickville** opposite the RSL has been razed. We didn't even get to hear of this proposal.
- * Marrickville Council will receive submissions concerning a draft LEP for **rezoning the former Eversleigh Hospital Petersham site** till 16 April. Draft plans are on exhibition at the Administrative Centre
- * The heritage-listed former Globe Worsted Mill in Gordon Street Marrickville is subject of an application for conversion into 117 residential apartments. Whilst the development will generate more traffic, it's an adaptive reuse of a heritage item and MHS has no heritage issue with the proposal.
- * An application to demolish an "unusually picturesque" federation house at **167 Denison Road Dulwich Hill** and erect five townhouses has been refused by Council following resident opposition.

AUTUMN TRIVIA ANSWERS

Is anyone out there? Not so judging from the (lack of) response to the autumn literary trivia questions. We asked what local suburbs were associated with various literary people. Dame Mary Gilmore (nee Cameron) taught 1891-95 at Stanmore Public School before going to Paraguay with the utopian movement. JC Bancks was born in Enmore in 1889. His creation Ginger Meggs first appeared in the Sydney Sun in 1921 and still appears in the Herald. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle lectured at a Spiritualist service in January 1921 in Stanmore Road Enmore (it is not clear where this was or whether Sherlock Holmes materialised). Poet and critic Christopher Brennan died in Lewisham on 5 October 1932. Petersham is in the biographical information relating to the fictitious poet Ern Malley, a famous 1940s hoax perpetrated by poets James McAuley and Harold Stewart.

Known as *Old Tom*, Tom Kenny lived at 30 Gannon Street **Tempe** until his death on 9 April 1980. A man with many talents and strong views, he self-published several books often challenging established viewpoints. He argued Dr Wardell's murder was a "government-inspired conspiracy" and that Thomas Wainewright, not Charles Dickens, wrote *Pickwick Papers*. He also wrote *The Historic Villages of Tempe and St Peters*. His works are collector's items. The Tom Kenny Reserve, Bayley Street, Dulwich Hill was named in his honour.

WHERE IS OUR MILESTONE? HERITAGE MILESTONE STUDY

Among the items listed in the 1986 Marrickville Heritage Study is the milestone that used to stand on the southern side of Parramatta Road Stanmore opposite Nelson Street: "constructed of sandstone the milestone is painted white and located on the footpath oriented diagonal to the road. The milestone is 1.1 m tall, 0.4m wide at the base and 0.35m wide at the top. The stone has an indentation on the SE face and is damaged on the northern corner."



The 1986 study was uncertain about its age, speculating it may have been laid during Governor Macquarie's time: "the stone, along with seven others in Camperdown, Ashfield, Croydon, Homebush, Lidcombe and Granville mark road established during the time of Governor

Macquarie and opened as a turnpike road on 10.04.1810."

According to a Parramatta Road businesswoman, the Stanmore milestone was badly damaged and removed after being hit by a car about three or four years ago. A milestone once on Taverner's Hill Petersham was last recorded there about 1940. The only other known extant local milestone stands in King Street Newtown opposite Missenden Road and a little to the southwest. It is made of concrete and painted a rather irksome mauve colour.

The Heritage Group of the Department of Public Works & Services is undertaking the Sydney Region Heritage Milestones Conservation Study for the RTA (which owns these milestones) with particular reference to the former Stanmore milestone and two in Croydon, one on Parramatta Road, the other on the Hume Highway. They believe the one formerly at Stanmore may have dated from as early as 1816. Anyone with information on this or any other Sydney milestone can contact Ms Challis Smedley at DPWS 9372 8484.

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THE LITTLE CORNER SHOP

I was born in Marrickville and spent the first 27 years of my life there before moving to Springwood in 1964. My maternal grandparents had grocery shops in Enmore and Petersham from about 1906 to 1924 and bought what was to be my home in Stoke Avenue in the latter year. I still go back to the area, driving or walking around "down memory lane" of my earlier life.

Which brings me to the point of this letter – the demise of the little corner shop that was such a feature not only of our area but suburban Sydney. I suppose this came about with the introduction of supermarkets with discounted goods, combined with the popularity of the motor car where distance from the shops ceased to be a problem.

In our area – Porter and Stoke Avenues [Marrickville] just off Wardell Road on the very borders of Dulwich Hill and Petersham postal areas – there were four little shops within five minutes walk that stocked a whole range of groceries, greengroceries and the little odds and ends needed by a household. We mostly dealt with Rubins, a Polish couple in Wardell Road facing Porter Avenue. But if they were closed we'd go to Strongs on the corner of Pile Street and Wardell Road. And nearby there was another little shop* on the eastern side of Wardell Road near Pile Street, and one just a short distance up Herbert Street.

We kids learned product differentiation early. Streets ice cream was the creamiest and was only sold by the Herbert Street shop; Peters and McNivens – very much second choices – were sold at each of the others. Same with soft drinks: we generally favoured Shelley's [made in Marrickville], followed by Marchants, but Osbornes (made over in Earlwood) was something special and only available, as I recall from the little shop near Strongs.

My grandfather had the smallest shop I have ever seen. It was on the Newington Road side of their house on the corner of that thoroughfare and John Street. He sold only groceries and it was still going until probably ten years ago. It was closed when I last passed by. There were just a few shops in my immediate area. I recall them as very friendly places, a meeting place for residents and an exchange for gossip. And of course most helped many locals with credit in hard times. The emergence of the new convenience stores fulfils the need provided by the little shops of old, but they will never have their warmth or idiosyncrasy, or indeed charm.

COUNCIL ARCHIVES UPDATE

Recently arrived in Marrickville Council's Archival Reference Centre are microfiche copies of rates records for Petersham Municipal Council (1871-1932) and St Peters Municipal Council (1871-1926), as well as Marrickville Municipal Council Valuation books (1908-1925) indexed by street and available on CD-ROM. These records are an excellent resource for tracing the history of houses. They usually show both owner and occupier of a property and can even include lot numbers, street numbers and house names.
