[In the mid 1930s] ... "My dad got a milk bar down at the old Olympia Theatre which was on Parramatta Road; used to be the Stanmore Twin. The Olympia Milk bar was next door to the old Olympia Theatre just down near Northumberland Avenue; and they managed it for a few years" (Pat Brunker).

"And then there was the iceman who at about five o'clock in the morning would run through the house with the ice wrapped up in a hessian bag and dump it in the icebox. If there was a lazy family the iceblock would be standing on the doorstep like a river. The iceworks were at the top of the street in Crystal Street" (Lu Bell).

"My mother washed on Monday, did the ironing on Tuesday, had Clan days on Wednesday, when all the ladies of the family met in one another's houses for lunch; Thursday she did the housework, Friday her shopping, Saturday her baking. But if anybody came in, she immediately got the 'girdle' (which was a cast-iron flat thing with a handle which she brought from Scotland with her) and she made pancakes; they call them pikelets in Australia ... at Christmas we always had Grandma's clootie pudding, which my father called plum duff" (Mollie Mitchell).

Oral history records people's perceptions of life as it was. Members of the Marrickville Heritage Society Oral History Group will present taped recollections of life in the Marrickville area and some of our informants. This is history everyone can relate to and participate in, so come and share the experience!

Launch of Camperdown Cemetery Kangaroo Grassland & Historic Plantings Restoration Project Sunday 17 February 11-1

In the MHS Newsletter of May 1998 I wrote about the wonderful remnant of Sydney Turpentine-Ironbark Forest still surviving in Newtown's Camperdown Cemetery. Swathes of Kangaroo Grass, Plume Grass and native lilies flowered around the gravesites and monuments in this much loved and well-used oasis in the inner city.

A group of interested people representing the Marrickville Heritage Society, Marrickville Council, Camperdown Cemetery Trust and Greening Australia have set up a small community project to protect and restore this endangered native vegetation. In April 2001, there was a very positive response to an article in the Sydney Morning Herald and an interview on ABC Radio 2BL about the vegetation and activities to protect it. In June Marrickville Council funded the installation of hardwood stakes to delineate the perimeter of the Kangaroo Grassland's 'No Mow' Zone and some public information signs as well as the preparation of a draft Restoration Strategy.

In September a Natural Heritage Trust Grant of \$5300 was awarded to the project. In October on advice from members of the Cemeteries Committee of the National Trust of Australia (NSW) the project was extended to include the protection and restoration of historic grave plantings existing within the remnant vegetation areas. The aim of the Camperdown Cemetery Kangaroo Grassland and Historic Plantings Restoration Project (what a mouthful!) is to maintain a mosaic of cultural and natural landscapes within the cemetery grounds.

The project will be launched at an Open Day on Sunday 17th February from 11 am to 1 pm at Camperdown Cemetery. Everyone is welcome! Doug Benson, Senior Plant Ecologist, Royal Botanic Gardens, will talk, there will be tours of the restoration areas, bush regeneration demonstrations and time for questions and refreshments. You can become a Friend of Camperdown Cemetery and be practically involved in the restoration of these significant heritage areas of native vegetation and historic grave plantings in the heart of Newtown!



SUMMER TRIVIA ANSWERS 1. CAMPERDOWN

Three respondents took the trouble to convey the origin of the suburb name Camperdown. Susan Pinson wrote: "Camperdown was named by Gov. Bligh in August 1806 in memory of a naval battle in which he took part in 1797. It was fought off the Dutch Coast and near the town of Kamperduin, 50 kilometres north of Amsterdam. The estate of 240 acres was granted to Bligh in 1806." Diane McCarthy added Governor Bligh served with the British Navy in a victory against the Dutch at the Battle of Camperdown (Kamperduin) in 1797. Kamperduin literally means "the Dunes of Kamp" and is a north Holland village near the North Sea. Dutch-born Christina Penning, who also proudly answer correctly, was chuffed over the Dutch connection.

Camperdown has been notable for several institutions: Camperdown Cemetery, consecrated in 1849, and still partly extant as St Stephens Cemetery; Fowlers Pottery, which thrived in Camperdown between the 1850s and 1919 when it was relocated to Marrickville; the Camperdown Childrens and Missenden Road hospitals (RPA & KGV); the velodrome and Bonds Hosiery with its famous Chesty Bond sign.

The 1882 school is still standing but now has other educational uses whilst Camperdown Park (original site of Fowlers Pottery) remains picturesque. It is not commonly known that Camperdown was also a municipality from 1862 to 1908 when much of it was absorbed by the City of Sydney Council. It is now administered by both Marrickville and Leichhardt Councils.

2. WHO WAS ALBERT FREDE?

As to the identity of **Albert Frede**, well, we stumped the entire membership. Little is known about the Rev. Albert Frede who was Minister of the 1907 The Warren Methodist Church when he died in 1963. According to the *Free Weekly* (6 June 1963) Albert was so favourably regarded that the

Marrickville Branches of the Old Age & Invalid Pensioners' Association, the Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Labour League recommended that the new women's rest centre at 400 Illawarra Road be named after him. Council adopted the recommendation and the Albert Frede Memorial Amenities Centre was opened on 25 September 1965.

The plaque commemorating the opening of the centre was recently removed by Council following sale of the building. Albert will still be remembered in Frede Lane which runs off Grove Street skirting his former home. The church which was on the corner of Illawarra Road and Warburton Street was demolished in the 1960s for unattractive flats and shops. Thanks to roving reporter **Diane McCarthy** for providing this doozie of a question and answer.

CHARLIE MEADER MEMORIAL GATES

On 6 December 2001 about 60 people witnessed the unveiling of the entrance gates at Henson Park Marrickville commemorating the late Charlie Meader. Charlie's children Chrys, Charles, Clark, Cheryl and Colin, his grandchildren and sister all attended along with council staff, friends and neighbours. Chrys remembered her father, read some newspaper reports regarding the esteem he was held in by the Rugby League world and thanked Wayne Carter for the idea. With jets flying overhead Mayor Barry Cotter unveiled the gates.

The plaque reads: "Named by Marrickville Council in recognition of the work of Charles James Meader (1926-2000). Charlie was an employee in the Parks and Reserves Section from 1943 to 1994. From 1964 to his retirement Charlie was caretaker of Henson Park, home ground to the Newtown Rugby League Football Club (the Bluebags/Jets). Charlie was a life long supporter of the team. His family, friends and work mates remember many happy days spent together in this park."

Historic Trail Plaque 7 funded by the Commonwealth Government (1988) states Henson Park "is the site of Thomas Daley's Standsure Brickworks from 1886 to 1924. Marrickville Municipal Council later purchased and filled in the disused brick pits which had become a dangerous waterhole. Henson Park was opened in 1933".

JOHN PAUL WHO?

The editor saved his biggest blooper of 2001 for the December/January newsletter, though astute members diplomatically refrained from hassling the offending author/editor. Member Kath Peterson was wryly amused to find her famous ancestor was none other than 1970s Australian pop icon John Paul Young whose biggest hit *Something in the Air* was reprised with great effect in *Strictly Ballroom* (filmed largely at Petersham Town Hall) in 1992. Ironically old *Countdown* reruns featuring Young have recently been shown on Rage.

Kath's ancestral pirate was, of course, John Paul Jones – not to be confused with the former Led Zeppelin bass player of that name and no connection with 'Paul Jones' the popular 1910s and 1920s dance whose object was to frequently change partners. Kath's John Paul Jones is credited with founding the American Navy in the late 18th century. During a 1779 naval battle when asked if he would surrender, he replied "I have not yet begun to fight"! Ironically both Jones and Young were born in Scotland, albeit 200 years apart.

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
