# HERITAGE WEEK 1986

Congratulations to Verona Rothwell and her hard-working Heritage Week Subcommittee (Anne Carolan, John Fenton-Smith, Paula Gard and Dawn Thompson) for a very successful week. Others prominent in organising this week were Barbara Little, Chrys Meader, Gregory Robertson and Robert Thompson.

### CHORAL AND ORGAN CONCERT AT ST BRIGID'S

A large crowd of several hundred enjoyed a varied and interesting programme featuring many local and nearby groups under the expert direction of St Brigid's Musical Director, Connie Cloran. Society member, organist David Pitt-Owen performed with his Phoenix Consort. In introducing the programme, Geoffrey Little and Lyn Collingwood outlined the rich musical heritage of Marrickville: Sister Gabriel inaugurated the Hyde Park Carols by Candlelight; Bela Dolesko, the Hungarian composer, settled here after 1945 and his great cantata was composed to celebrate the coming of peace; Father Stanislaus Cross of St Brigid's had a great dedication to musical scholarship. There are many other contributors to this tradition including Richard Meale (composer of the Australian opera, Voss) who grew up in Marrickville. Special thanks must also go to Father Terence, parish priest of St Brigid's, who welcomed us for the second year and organised supper after the concert.

### LOCAL BUSH DANCE

There were some stiff joints the morning after but everyone who danced to the music of our Society member Lionel Swift's Diamentina Bush Band voted the evening a huge success, especially a large number of young people who attended. Under Lionel's expert direction, some of the young at heart who had not graced a dance floor for 20 years were soon kicking up their heels effortlessly to the music. Plans are now afoot to hold more dances, perhaps even on a regular basis, leading up to a Grand Colonial Ball in 1988. Special thanks must go to Tony and Tina who came all the way from their Northbridge Delicatessen to provide light refreshments, and to Marrickville Council who generously granted the use of the Town Hall.

### LOCAL AUTHOR HONOURED

Petersham resident Gerard Windsor was an official Australian participant at the Adelaide Writers' Week 1986. Gerard has published two volumes of short stories, The Harlots Enter First (Hale & Iremonger, 1982) and Memories of the Assassination Attempt (Penguin, 1985). The second volume, which was short listed for the 1986 National Book Council Award, includes several stories based on the area, including 'The Sad Music of Men' which is based on Armon Nursing Home located on the corner of Croydon and Palace streets, Petersham.
