The members and guest speaker, Chris Pratten of the National Trust, crossed the street to the Council Chambers opposite and negotiated several flights of stairs in the semi-darkness only to find the alternate venue (the function room) temporarily without power. Then came the announcement that our usual room had been miraculously opened. So back we went.

Our warmest thanks must go to Chris Pratten for his good-natured acceptance of this nomadic start to the Meeting. Totally undeterred, he proceeded with a talk which was enjoyable and informative to all.

Chris is Environment Director at the National Trust; among the activities of his department are house inspections, bush management and the preservation of streetscapes. They also operate a real estate service which promotes the sale of historic properties to people who will both appreciate and preserve them.

We saw slides on the National Trust's successes, structures and sites saved for posterity, such as the M.W.S. & D.B. bridge at Oatley and the precious woodhen breeding grounds on Lord Howe Island.

The National Trust encourages the 'recycling' of buildings so that their original character is retained and they also meet a current need in the community. Much attention is being focused on disused industrial buildings at present.

Chris Pratten gave us a glimpse of restorations in progress on his own home. The Trust is always happy to oblige its members with advice about restoring their homes and gardens, and , of course, always happy to welcome new members!
