

MARRICKVILLE HERITAGE ITEMS UNDER ONGOING THREAT

Out of the blue last July came the appalling news of the abandonment by Marrickville Council of "further consideration of the 195 proposed heritage items identified in the Marrickville Heritage Study Review 2001" (as reported in August newsletter). The vote was tied, with the chairperson, Independent Councillor Dimitrios Thanos casting the deciding vote.

The draft Marrickville Urban Study (October 2006) indicates "local heritage is highly valued and adds to the character of the LGA" (p. 10). This statement seems to be supported in principle in Action 1.7 (p. 42) which is to "protect heritage from inappropriate development . . . A number of studies have been undertaken in the past into defining heritage in order to protect these items from inappropriate Development . . . A clear objective is achieving compatibility between existing (historic) and contemporary new development."

Whilst all this sounds positive, one wonders how this sits with the following, elsewhere in the document (p. 14): "Heritage is highly valued and presents a development constraint given the desire to retain this value. Heritage properties are found across the LGA, with significant concentrations in Newtown, Enmore, Stanmore, Petersham and Lewisham. There are 307 lots listed as MLEP heritage items or on the State Heritage Register. These sites are deemed to be absolute constraints to future development."

Submissions to Marrickville Council on the draft Marrickville Urban Strategy are due on 15 December. And its not just Marrickville – this is a **statewide process** with development clearly the main goal.

OUR LAST MEETING: 25 NOVEMBER 1) TROCADERO HALL, NEWTOWN

MHS president and consulting architect, **Scott MacArthur**, conducted a fascinating tour of the restored Trocadero building in King Street Newtown, and glimpses into its history. Around 40 people trudged up and down stairs, marvelling at the scale and design of the building. The exterior restoration was beautifully done, so it was quite a shock to step inside and see the damage caused by neglect, white ants, tenants and the 1999 hailstorm.

The land, originally part of Grose Farm, and later owned by Governor Bligh, was not built on until the 1880s, when two terrace houses were erected on the site. These were bought in the late 1880s by Frederick Ferrier, a city publican, who began building "the grandest roller skating rink in Australia", incorporating the existing terraces. It was completed in 1889 and



named the Trocadero. It was a grand concept, at a time of booming real estate and confidence. It housed the roller skating rink, billiard and reading rooms, Turkish baths, hairdressing salon, and had electric lighting. The foyer was tiled and had a fountain. The skating rink was magnificent, with ornate plasterwork and mirrored walls, a walkway around the walls to view the skaters, and part of the roof opened. The roof trusses are wrought iron, and combine functionality with elegance.

We could see tantalising glimpses of the former glory, in



the plasterwork and staircases remaining after the ravages of weather and tenants who used the building more as a factory space – Properts Motor Body Co. Limited operated there from the 1920s to the 1950s, and more recently, a second hand furniture dealer added a mezzanine floor to the skating rink.

Moore College acquired the building in 1974 and presided over a continuing deterioration until community pressure caused it to be listed on the State Heritage Register in 2000, which required the building's condition to be upgraded. Scott encountered a problem unusual in restoring landmark buildings – there was only one illustration of the original Trocadero to be found, and not one photo. Hopefully, now that the exterior has been restored, Moore College will find a tenant, and work can commence on the interior restoration.

2) RPAH MUSEUM & ARCHIVES

Tucked away in the inner sanctum of the King George V building (winner 1941 Sulman Award for Architecture: see Notes) at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, Camperdown is the RPAH Museum and Archives. The museum director **Helen Croll**, assisted by archivist **Mair Jones**, both volunteers, walked us through the exhibits of 'lethal' looking surgical instruments, photographs and other assorted nursing history on our tour of Saturday 25 November.

The museum has been in existence since 1933 and recently found a home, after several locations, in the heritage-listed operating theatres of the former King George V Memorial Hospital for Mothers and Babies which was opened in 1941. Its state-of-the-art operating theatres, a first for Australia, were introduced by Sir Herbert Schlink, for many years Chairman of RPAH, who had travelled to Europe looking for a more practical design to overcome contamination problems. The new theatres featured a circular construction with a domed ceiling which enhanced the light source, reducing the risk of infection. Schlink later married the first woman gynaecologist to serve at King George, Margaret Mulvey, whose appointment set a precedent whereby at least one woman gynaecologist was to serve on the staff.

A tantalising peek into the past was the Prince Alfred 1884 Register of Admissions and Discharge Register. A patient, aged 46, whose residence was described as being Newtown Police station, spent 31 days in hospital being treated for alcoholism and a cut head. She was noted as being destitute, so the cost of her hospitalisation, being 3 pounds 9 shillings and 9 pence was presumably written off as a bad debt. From the large number of patients recorded as destitute one wonders if the hospital didn't suffer a funding crisis.

The museum will shortly welcome their first professional curator who will carry on the fine job done by the current group of conscientious volunteers. Thank you Helen and Mair for hosting both tours.

A couple of members remarked on the Sulman Award plaque now missing from the walls of KGV. Some members found family connections among the photos, publications and name-embroidered banners. One photo shows Nurses Ellen Julia Gould, Julia Johnston and Penelope Frater outside Ermelo Private Hospital, which Misses Gould and Johnston operated in Woodbury Street, Dulwich Hill for a few years from 1903. They had been stationed in the town of Ermelo in South Africa during the Boer War.

80TH ANNIVERSARY OF BRADMAN LINK TO PETERSHAM OVAL

With Australia's endeavours to regain the Ashes from England under way, we note the 80th anniversary of Don Bradman's first century scored in Sydney grade cricket at Petersham Oval. Playing for St George against Petersham on 27 November and 4 December 1926 Bradman scored 110 and took 3/26 with his spin bowling. A 2002 plaque at Petersham Oval commemorates the feat.

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HISTORIC ENMORE BAKERY BUILDING

The 1875 property on the north eastern side of **the intersection of Liberty Street and Stanmore Road**, once 40 Stanmore Road, and **now 27-29 Stanmore Road**, is advertised for sale with 'unlimited potential'. **This property is not protected by a heritage listing**.

FW Johnson opened a bakery in St Peters in 1870 and in 1875 moved to the above site for a purpose-built bakery. The rear of the building, which is seen from Liberty Street, appears much as when it was a purpose-built bakery. The bakery was converted in 1914 to one of Sydney's first specialist vendors of petroleum when the bakery moved to new premises across the road. The building has both local and state significance for its use in two retail trades in the 19th and 20th century. It is also important as the portal to the commercial intersection at the corner of Enmore, Stanmore and Edgeware Roads with its substantial former bank and post office premises and hotel.

It has local Marrickville significance showing the financial success of the Johnson family over three generations who catered for local residents over a number of suburbs: FW Johnson 1849-1898 who built these premises; FJ Johnson 1877-1928 who built the premises on the southern side of Stanmore Road, later demolished for flats; WF Johnson, born 1911; Kim Johnson, born 1940, and David Johnson who joined the staff under WF Johnson before it was taken over during the consolidation of bakeries by very large firms.

The building is a physical remnant of past business enterprise in Newtown/Stanmore and has State significance as remaining physical evidence of a successful locally-owned bakery that survived over three generations in a number of locations in the present Marrickville LGA. FW Johnson, who shared in the economic gains from population surge in the 1880s-1893 in the inner west, survived economic conditions that challenged other business people, including bakers.

The 1890s depression, reduced population and demand, with young men overseas fighting World War I, created difficult trading conditions up to 1920; depression after 1927 and strikes after World War II reduced numbers of bakeries, but Johnson's survived and even took over other bakeries until the amalgamation of the bakery trade by a small number of large scale enterprises in the 1950s. The flour mill at [old] Newtown station has survived with reuse as physical evidence of 19th and early 20th century Australian mill ownership. These premises represent local ownership of final processing of flour. Both industries are now dominated by multinational production.

The premises have a second significance from one of its reuses when the corner became Harrison's Motor Garage in 1914 and was so listed in *Sand's Directory* in 1915. The corner elevation to Stanmore Road and Liberty Street shows the modifications made to convert it to a drive-in petrol station. (The building was also partly used by Brightside laundry.) Harrison's Motor Garage was one of the first garages in suburban Sydney when petrol was sold in cans before bowsers became more common after World War I. The garage was later an Atlantic garage.

IN MEMORIAM

The Society sends its condolences to the families and friends of these people:

- Ruth May Brown, formerly of Leichhardt and Summer Hill, died on 2 July aged 74. She was principal at various primary schools including Yagoona and taught drama. After retirement she was actively involved in many organisations including Probus. Ruth was a MHS member from 2000 and regularly attended meetings until overtaken by ill health.
- Nora Kathleen Peek who died on 29 October aged 91, was a founding member, president for 12 years and stalwart of the Ashfield & District Historical Society. The ADHS *Journal* No 10, 1993, p. 4 said Nora had "unrivalled knowledge of local history and its sources, her indefatigable enthusiasm for research, her wide contacts, and her dedicated commitment to the goals of the organisation, have made an immeasurable impact on the Society's activities". Nora co-wrote (with Chris Pratten) *Working the Clays: The Brickmakers of the Ashfield District* (1996).
- Nicholas John (Nick) Vine Hall late of Belrose, died on 31 October aged 62. He was "author, genealogist, radio broadcaster, publisher and maritime historian ... and wrote *Tracing Your Family History in Australia: A Guide to Sources and of Parish Registers in Australia.*" Nick was one of our Society's earliest guest speakers when in October 1984, as Director of the Society of Australian Genealogists, he gave 'a fascinating address on researching family history.'

THE HIGHS & LOWS OF 2006

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TEMPE HOUSE FOR SALE

Expressions of Interest have closed for the sale or lease of John Verge's recently restored 1836 Tempe House and the adjacent St Magdalene's Chapel (1888, pictured at front) whose address is given as 3 Magdalen [sic] Terrace, Wolli Creek. An Inner West Courier 28/11/06 ad promoted these icons as "heritage buildings with character", however no reference was made to Tempe House, Verge, AB Spark, or the age and significance of these fine edifices. Blurb also indicates "surrounded by over approx. 1000 new residential units". The Property Look website gives brief, but relevant, historical information.



Gallipoli & the historic cities of Turkey April/May 2007 - Expressions of Interest

(tour not being conducted by Marrickville Heritage Society)

Geoff Ostling, former MHS President and recently-retired history teacher, is leading a study tour to Turkey in April/ May 2007. It will include the Anzac Day Dawn Service at Anzac Cove and the Australian National Service at Lone Pine, with the opportunity to explore all the major ANZAC battle sites and cemeteries of the Gallipoli peninsula.

Then, for two weeks there will be guided tours of all the major archaeological sites and museums - Istanbul, Troy, Ephesus, Pamakkule, Hieropolis, Antalya, Capadocia, Konya, Ankara and Istanbul. The tour will include economy airfares to and from Istanbul, an experienced Englishspeaking guide, quality hotels with en suite bathrooms, breakfasts and most other meals, entrance fees to archaeological sites and museums, air-conditioned coach travel, a twilight dinner-cruise on the Bosphorus and several rest days for shopping and exploring.

DONNITHORNE FIND ON AUCTION

At auction in London on 7-8 December (www.grosvenor-auctions.co.uk/action.lasso) is Lot #224: a "1838 (November 1st) Sydney embossed paid envelope, printed to private order, an example with a very fine impression of the embossed seal, sent 1849 (Sept 27th) with red 'FREE/SE *27/1849' circular date stamp. A very rare item, these envelopes and letter sheets were the World's first Postage Paid Stationery". No doubt a collector's philatelic gem, but because the auction is London-based, the description fails to reveal the name of the addressee on the envelope: 'Miss Donnithorne New Town'. The auction takes place after MHS newsletter is out.
