# **BUILDINGS AT POSSIBLE RISK**

William Grant of Marrickville had a letter published in the Daily Telegraph on 25 January stating: "The historic Henson Park Hotel is to be razed. The iconic and spiritual home of the famous Newtown Jets, their many supporters and generations of local patrons will be sold, stripped of its license and placed in developers' hands. The management group of the pub has placed a submission with Marrickville Council to transfer the gaming license to a premises smack bang in the middle of a busy a shopping centre, on one of Sydney's tightest bottlenecks . . . One of the last surviving pubs with original art deco architecture and interior will be lost forever."

A DA has been lodged with council regarding **Reiby** Hall at 37 Station Street Newtown "to undertake internal and external alterations to the existing dwelling house to create a community facility for the unincorporated Newtown RSL sub-branch." Is this the beginning of the death knell for this 1905 hall (formerly a gospel hall and adjacent to the former Reiby House) used since 1995 as a yoga centre?

# MHS MEMBERS HONOURED

Congratulations to **Norman McVicker** OAM who on 3 January was presented with "the NSW Government Community Service Award for his contribution to local and national history" – the highest award the State can give. Norman has voluntarily written local and Australian history for the Mudgee community in the *Mudgee Guardian* for the past 17 years with over 900 columns. He was awarded the OAM in June 2003.



In the 2007 Australia Day Honours the OAM (General Division) was awarded to both Lesley Muir and her husband Brian Madden, both MHS members and well known statewide in local history circles. Lesley's award was "for service to

recording and preserving local history, particularly in the Canterbury District." Brian's award was "for service to the community through the recording and preservation of local history and as an executive member of historical societies." Both have written a number of historical

Among other recipients we congratulate are Gary Blaschke "for service to sport through the Disabled Surfers Association of Australia, and to the environment;" Gary led our walk through the Chullora Wetlands last July; and Peter Watts whose award was "for leadership in the conservation and preservation of Australian heritage, chiefly with the Historic Houses Trust of NSW and the Australian Garden History Society, and to the Arts."

# **IN MEMORIAM**

In our June 2006 newsletter we reported on MHS member William (Bill) Edwin Hamnett having turned 100 years old on 24 April 2006. Bill died on 28 October after a short illness. He spent most of his early life in the Marrickville area attending Chapel Street Public and Fort Street High Schools; he worked in local companies before becoming a successful businessman. Our condolences go to his family, and his sister Hilda York, a long term MHS member.

We note the passing of **Judith Baldwin** late of Dulwich Hill on 16 January. Judith had been a MHS member since 1998. Our condolences to Judith's husband Graham, also a member, and their family.

Our condolences also go to the family of **Kevin John Berry** who died on 7 December aged 61 after a long illness. Kevin was raised in Warburton Street Marrickville and attended De La Salle College, Marrickville. He became Australia's foremost butterfly swimmer representing Australia in both the 1960 Rome and 1964 Tokyo Olympic Games when he won the 200 metres butterfly in world record time and came third in the medley relay. He won three gold medals at the 1962 Perth Commonwealth Games and in his career broke 12 individual world records.

He later became a well known press photographer, pictorial editor of the Sydney Morning Herald and head of ABC Sport. He was inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame in 1980. In 1998 Kevin wrote 2000 Things You Didn't Know About the Olympic Games and in April 2000 he was a guest speaker during a Heritage Festival event at Newington College jointly organised by MHS and the Heritage Promotions Committee.

#### SUMMER TRIVIA ANSWER

Liberty Street Enmore is the only known example of a street in the Marrickville LGA where the numbers on either side of the street run in opposite directions. On the western side the low even numbers start at the railway end; on the eastern side the low odd numbers start at the Stanmore Road end. This apparent anomaly existed as far back as the 1890s according to Sands Directories. It was probably associated with poor coordination between the former Newtown and Petersham Councils as the boundary was down the middle of the street. The eastern side has housing along the entire length whilst on the western side there are only about 6-10 dwellings.

Liberty Street was so-called because it was used by travellers in carriages wanting to avoid the toll bars in King Street Newtown. The original toll bar was near Forbes Street and later a second was erected at Newtown Bridge. Both were abolished in 1882.

Precisely ten years ago in the February 1997 MHS newsletter a more detailed explanation about the name Liberty Street was given apropos the same trivia question. With a correct answer neither time, it seems this trivia question has taken its toll!

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# PICTORIAL HISTORY MARRICKVILLE

The latest in the pictorial series of Kingsclear Books examines the eleven suburbs in the Marrickville LGA is as eye-catching as ever. These books are designed to provide a brief historical background and memories of earlier eras, largely with a view to encouraging readers to look further into local history. The photos are supplemented with text written by historian, Anne-Maree Whitaker. Much of the photographic material was provided by the Marrickville Council History & Archive Centre.

Included are streetscapes, shops, houses, factories, mills, cinemas, shops, brickpits, processions and churches. A shot of a dairy on the corner of Carrington Road and Ruby Street Marrickville reminds us that dairies still abounded just a century ago, whilst in 1932, Girl Guides assembled in the grounds of the Abergeldie estate in Dulwich Hill. We are also reminded of more recent events such as the night in April 1990 "when the night sky over St Peters was lit up by blinding white fireballs . . . [following] an explosion . . . at the Boral LPG distribution depot in Burrows Road"; also of demonstrators against the opening of the Third Runway in 1995 and the subsequent mass demolition of houses in Sydenham.

The book is further enhanced by two sections new to the pictorial history series – one on architectural styles and the other titled Tracing Your House History with reference to a range of state and local resources, including the Marrickville Heritage Society, giving its purpose and contact details. A bibliography, a Marrickville chronology and an index round out the book.

However, some errors of fact have been found. On page 60, we read in the lower photo caption of a tram said to be going along Unwins Bridge Road Sydenham past the demolished Rex Cinema in 1923 - in fact the tram is in Railway Road in 1954 and the cinema building still exists, though not as a cinema. Also, the mistake is perpetuated that Annette Kellerman was born in Silver Street Marrickville (p. 30), a fact not verified by Annette's birth certificate, which indicates she was born in Darlinghurst; the Kellermans did later live in Silver Street (see August 2005 newsletter).
