Heritage Volunteer Award 2011 to MHS

Nominated by Marrickville Council, Marrickville Heritage Society was one of 24 recipients of the NSW Government Heritage Volunteer Awards presented at a ceremony in Parramatta on 9 December 2011. The certificate, which was received by the Society's president, Dr Sonia Laverty, was 'In recognition of an outstanding contribution to heritage conservation in New South Wales'. Awards were presented by Gabrielle Kibble, Chair of the Heritage Council of NSW, who was also the keynote speaker.

Ms Kibble said the awards recognise 'the outstanding work being conducted by individuals and groups in conserving and promoting heritage conservation and awareness throughout the community. The projects that you are undertaking stretch across the heritage sector – from built to cultural, natural, Aboriginal and maritime heritage – and incorporate a diverse range of activities including conservation, research, education, management and promotion of heritage in NSW.'

'Despite the many difficulties that may arise . . . communities often have an inherent passion for their heritage and the dedicated and hard working volunteers contribute countless hours and tireless effort to ensure that this heritage is managed, conserved and promoted to the broader community.'

Among the other recipients was Mari Metzke 'for the instrumental role she has played in providing advice and guidance to countless history projects and for her detailed research into the history of Hornsby'.

Save Sydenham's Coptic Church!

It looks like Council is determined to pursue its goal of demolishing the 1904 Coptic (formerly Methodist) Church in Railway Road Sydenham. Whilst no community group has so far emerged with the funds to purchase the property, what's to say this won't happen in the future. It seems futile to demolish one of the few heritage buildings left in Sydenham in order for the site to become further parkland, especially given the grossly underused Sydenham Green across the road. This is apart from the ethical issue whereby the federal government of the 1990s gave this building to Council for community use. Or, was it intended all along for this church building to be eventually demolished to enable the eventual widening of Railway Road to carry yet more trucks than the huge volume it already accommodates?

As at end of 2011, **Audley Street Petersham** is the local street with the most MHS memberships. Excluding one member who has not renewed fees, there are seven memberships embracing ten members (otherwise it would have been eight/eleven).

By way of comparison, at the end of 2001, Cavendish Street Stanmore had six memberships with seven members; Audley Street Petersham had five memberships with ten members.

St Clements Church Marrickville has lodged a further DA to remove 14 pews. Whilst this DA is less radical than the one lodged in late 2010 (later withdrawn), the Society opposes this DA on the grounds that permanent removal of 14 pews will significantly alter the church interior and that the church has expressed no plans to retain the pews. However the church is commended for its proposal to repair damaged flooring and supports.

He specialised in old locks, tins and weights as well as books on local, Australian and central Asian history. Les died on 22 November 2011 aged 74.


Vale Chris Bartlett

Chris was known to many members for his dedication to conservation work around Cooks River and Wolli Creek. Some years ago Chris was instrumental in founding the Mudcrabs, an eco-volunteer group affiliated with the Cooks River Valley Association. The Muddies – now 480-strong – do regular clean-ups along and revegetation of the banks of Cooks River, with the backing and support of local councils. Chris enjoyed sharing his encyclopaedic botanical knowledge and passing on his skills, having once worked in the Botanic Gardens, Sydney. His work was recognised by Canterbury City Council when he was made 2009 Senior Citizen of the Year. His love



of flora was expressed in the exquisite drawings he created in Australia and New Guinea where he travelled extensively on foot. His life was celebrated at a gathering in Rosedale Reserve, Croydon Park on 5 February (Chris's birthday). He had been a most valued friend of mine since the early 1970s. Excerpts from 'Memories of my Newtown'

I remember lunch time in the lunch shed [at Camdenville Infants], having to sit up straight, all of us watched constantly for any sign of bad eating manners. Whenever we tots forgot and used two hands to hold our sandwiches, we were gently admonished with the words 'sandwiches are not heavy, we should use one hand for holding sandwiches.'

A sad sight of the area was the plight of the homeless and alcoholic men who frequented and probably slept in the disused brick pits nearby. Many had descended to drinking methylated spirits and sometimes added brown boot polish to their small bottles to improve its appearance. 'Metho' was easily and cheaply available from all corner shops. Most of the men pretended the purchases were for other purposes, but one poor man when handed his bottle, felt it and said 'You wouldn't have a cold one would you mate'?

Between our shop and lane towards King Street there stood four or five small single-storey houses, one of which belonged to the Senior family. Around the corner fronting King Street we had a fruit shop owned by a gentle and amiable Chinese man. Bill Bridge had a tattoo shop and he imported from, I think Germany, what was then a revolutionary little ear-piercing machine which had a trigger-action to send, when fired, a tiny hollow steel cylinder into the ear lobe. By hooking an earring sleeper into the cylinder and pulling the cylinder through the ear, the earring was neatly installed. My mother and I promptly had our ears pierced by Bill without further delay. Before Bill's machine, most people had their piercing done by their grandmother or aunt, using a sewing needle, and holding a cork behind the ear, then having to insert the earring through the ear where the needle had pierced it.

The Society also notes the deaths on 10 November 2011 aged 87 of notable artist **David Boyd** OAM, who for many years in lived in Silver Street, St Peters; and of **Betty Spears** OAM on 24 January 2012 aged 85. Betty grew up locally and attended St Brigid's Marrickville. She went on to become prominent in the labour movement including being Deputy President of the Federated Clerks Union (NSW). She is best remembered locally for having the Betty Spears Child Care Centre, Tempe named after her.

Blown to Blazes & other works of JB Blair Presented by Richard & David Blair Marrickville Library Monday 27 February 6.30 pm

Blown to Blazes and Other Works of JB Blair is an anthology of 62 short stories and essays by Jim Blair published from the 1930s to the 1950s in *The Bulletin* and elsewhere. Humour abounds amid themes that include science fiction, whimsical schemes for making fame or fortune, sport, politics, reminiscence, human nature, and the adventures of the Noyes family. Six Noyes stories were inspired by the author's family life (Blair > blare > noise > Noyes) from the mid-1940s when they lived in Porter Avenue Marrickville. The book, edited and published by Jim's eldest son, David Blair, includes a biography of Jim, commentary about *The Bulletin* (now defunct) plus over 100 illustrations by acclaimed illustrators such as Unk White, John Frith, Norman Hetherington and Percy Lindsay.

Richard Blair will describe how Jim was invited to abandon his vocation as an Adelaide shipping clerk to establish an uncertain but enthralling career in



Sydney as a journalist with *The Bulletin* and editor of the *Australian Woman's Mirror*, where, among other things, he introduced *The Phantom* comic strip into Australia. **David Blair** will supplement Richard's narrative by reading excerpts from some of Jim's works.



Dear Sonia


