Old Marrickville Town Hall under threat

Built in 1878, this is now the oldest civic building still standing in the Municipality and is the oldest of the many Town Halls within the present Municipality. It has a Section 130 Order under the <u>Heritage Act</u>, is identified in the Marrickville Heritage Study and is Recorded by the National Trust.

The building was used by Marrickville Council from 1879 until 1922 when it was sold to the Department of Education for £3,050 and opened as Marrickville Boys' Junior Technical School in 1923. It later became part of Marrickville Public School and remained in use until the end of 1985.



The building has remained vacant ever since; it has been broken into many times and a lot of damage has been done. There have been two fires; the latest occurring on 27 December, 1986, which extensively damaged the rear weatherboard section of the building. Although the Dept. of Education still owns the building, it no longer requires it, and new owners and a new use have to be found. It is unfortunate that the building has been allowed to remain vacant for so long without adequate security or proper surveillance. When vacated at the end of 1985, the Old Town Hall was in good condition; it is now practically derelict and the Department's proposal to board it up with corrugated iron hardly seems appropriate. The building should be repaired and adequately secured now - before it is too late.

The Society has applied to the Heritage Council for an Interim Conservation Order on the building and to the National Trust to upgrade its Recorded status to Classified.

We are seeking an on-site inspection with the Education Minister. We have also written to Marrickville Council seeking a meeting to discuss Council's support for the building to be used for a local history museum.

Rose's Emporium Update

The illegal demolition of <u>Rose's Emporium</u>, a historic building on the corner of Parramatta Road and Railway St, Stanmore, on Sunday August 24 1986, has angered many members of this Society. <u>Rose's Emporium</u> was supposed to be protected by a Section 130 Conservation Order but the site is now no more than an ugly pile of rubble. The following paragraph was printed in <u>The Glebe</u> on January21, 1987....

THE historic facade of famed Rose's Emporium at Stanmore could be rebuilt, restoration architect Clive Lucas told the Land and Environment Court. He was called as a witness for Planning and Environment Minister Bob Carr in one of the four cases involving Rose's illegal demolition now in the courts. The minister is asking the court to order that any development of the Parramatta Road site includes a reconstruction of the historic facade. Carr's department is involved in three cases, including a prosecution of Marrickville Council, the developer and the owners for destruction of the heritage law-protected building. Meanwhile the owners have launched their own suit against the developer in the Supreme Court, to force him to pay for the property.

There were further protests from local residents about the demolition of "San Remo", a house at 22 Croydon St, Stanmore, between Christmas and New Year - when most of the Society's executive were away on holidays. "San Remo" was a two storey house with a particularly elegant cedar staircase. From its architectural style it would appear to have been built in the 1830s but the area was not subdivided until the 1850s and the house is not recorded in "Sand's Directory" until 1889 when it was the home of Henry S. Rickards, Merchant.
In 1915 it became the residence of Robert Duffield, piano importer and tenant of Rose's Emporium!

Marrickville Council gave permission for the site to be developed some months ago and there is no record of Heritage Council or any other preservation orders placed on the building. Five two storey town houses are being built on the site.
