Around 40 members attended the Society's Annual General Meeting on June 25 at the Petersham Town Hall. Outgoing President Richard Cashman reported that the


society had had an important and exceptional year.

### Marrickville's Oldest Residence?

STANMORE HOUSE - ENMORE ROAD

It is hard now to see the beautiful mid-19th century house shown in the photograph behind the 20th century additions. It is probably the oldest house still standing in Marrickville Municipality and certainly the oldest of the large houses associated with early settlers.

The woman who built the house, Mary Reiby, remains a puzzle. As a young teenager she posed as a male to commit the crimes which led to her transportation and then followed a ladylike and successful colonial life to become one of Australia's outstanding early businesswomen and possibly the best known female emancipist. Her biography, Mary Reiby - Molly Incognita: Emancipist Extraordinaire, by Nance Irvine is in the local history collection at Marrickville Library.

It is believed that an older house, now demolished, was lived in by Mary Reiby herself while this house was built for her beloved daughter and son-in-law. A solitary house in Enmore Road is marked as owned by Mary Reiby on an 1848 map.

Fortunately, architects and historians are aware of the great significance of this house in Australia's pre-gold rush history. But isn't is time we recognised its importance locally?

# Speaking Personally: Airport Curfew

SOCIETY MEMBER MARK MATHESON WRITES:

"We all know how St. Peters and the surrounding areas have regressed since the pastoral days described in our latest Journal, how the airport and traffic to the airport and its attendant industries have made the area less and less attractive. Senator Evans, the Minister for Transport, is now meeting with local municipal councils (S.M.H. July 12) in order to expand operations and eliminate the curfew on night flights. The politicians and operators are confident of further expansion because there is no perceived resident opposition; they are relying on our passivity. I believe itscrucial that we speak now (by ringing 211-4570, Department of Aviation, or writing to council) in order to maintain our standard of living."

#### **President's Report**

This has been an important and exceptional year for the Society, partly due to the Bicentennial. We have had more functions than ever before: including two enjoyable cruises, the Pioneers' and Residents' Picnic Day and the Bicentennial Heritage Concert.

The Society has also taken a nigher profile in regard to heritage in Marrickville. One highlight of the year was the visit of the Hon. Bob Carr, then Minister for Planning & the Environment and Minister for Heritage on September 13. After Mr. Carr toured selected sites of Marrickville he announced a number of local heritage initiatives at a public meeting at Marrickville Town Hall

None of the above, along with the regular work of the Society, could have been achieved without many people working hard on many fronts. It has given me much encouragement to see how many people, both on and off the Executive, in large and small ways, have worked hard for the Society including many behind-the-scenes jobs.

I believe that we can look together with some measure of confidence to the coming year. We have an expanding membership, 220 by last count, and events, particularly the excursions, have been very well patronised. We can look forward to two more major Bicentennial events: the re-erection of Gilbert Doble's Winged Victory statue in November and the establishment of the archives.

There are some significant challenges which face us. With the change in the State Government there will be new heritage directions. We have extended the same invitation made to Mr. Carr to the new Minister. However, beyond that we will have to be very vigilant about heritage.

I believe that in many areas we have become more professional in our operations in terms of publicity, organising public events, presentation and design of printed material. The challenge is to be complete professionals in every phase of our activities which includes lobbying and even inter-personal relations.

We also need to maintain our position as a non-political Society which attracts people with quite different interests in heritage. We are a very plural Society. It is our strength. It will not be a weakness providing members co-operate in the common interest of heritage without necessarily compromising their individual interests Richard Cashman or perspectives.

# Brockleigh Update

The demolisher of the building known as "Brockleigh", 86-90 Illawarra Road, Marrickville, has been convicted of an offence under the Heritage Act and a penalty of \$2000 has been imposed by the court. In addition, the defendant was ordered to pay the Prosecutor's costs of \$15000.

The Minister for Planning and Environment has the power to halt development of the site for up to 10 years. Representations to the Minister on this matter may convince him to impose the maximum penalty. Bruce Welch
