Visit to Lydham Hall

SATURDAY FEBRUARY 25th, 10.30 a.m. LYDHAM HALL, 18 LYDHAM AVE. BEXLEY.

Did you know that Rockdale Council has its own local Museum? It is Lydham Hall, a beautiful sandstone house built by wealthy butcher Joseph Davis in 1860 on the highest point of land between Cooks and Georges Rivers. It is a good example of the transition from simple colonial architecture to the more ornate mid-Victorian style. Popular historian Alderman Ron Rathbone will tell us the history of the house and the museum on our visit.

Welcome Home

At 11.00 am on 11.11.1988 the 'Winged Victory' statue was officially unveiled by Sir Thomas Daly and once again stood proudly on top of the memorial at Marrickville Town Hall. Two years of work, planning and a bit of nervous excitement culminated in this special day in the history of the Marrickville Municipality.

Sculptor, Alex Koloszy collected the remaining top half in November, 1987 from the Petersham Works Depot where the Winged Victory had hung in fading glory for over a quarter of a century. The unveiling saw the combination of the beautiful recreation of the missing lower half and the careful restoration of Gilbert Doble's original work. The Mayor, Ald. Barry Jones, gave a note of thanks to both Koloszy and Doble. A reply on Doble's behalf was made by John Hatton, M.P. whose wife Vera's family were longstanding friends of Doble. (It was

OUR LAST MEETING Bridging the Past

Marrickville Municipality can add another claim to fame to its list -we have one of the last remaining Whipple Truss bridges in the State. At our last meeting on Saturday, November 26th bridge expert or Don Fraser introduced members co some of the more interesting bridges in our area. Perhaps our most notable bridge is the Long Cove Creek viaduct, a railway bridge at Lewisham. There are actually three iron/steel truss bridges on this site, each one added as the railway lines increased. The Whipple Truss, built in 1886 to replace the original stone arch viaduct, is one of the few in NSW and is classified by the National Trust. The Open Lattice Truss followed in the early 1890s and the Warren Truss was added in the 1920s. Another hidden treasure is Battle Bridge on Parramatta Road at Taverners Hill. Dr Fraser discovered that the original masonry bridge built pre-1885 is still in place underneath the sixlane highway! Our engineers and those responsible for bridge building argued for many years over the relative merits of British or American bridge construction and often the end result depended on the loyalties of the decision makers.

thanks to Anne Carolan that the Doble connection was discovered). John Hatton made Doble or "Bertie" as he preferred to be called, come alive for the audience of about 300. As he so eloquently put it "art is the antithesis of war" and this is what the Winged Victory symbolises.

The unveiling of the original Winged Victory on 24th May,1919 was an occasion of deep sorrow and mourning. The Bicentennial restoration unveiling recognised this with the laying of wreaths by R.S.L. Clubs. Relatives of those whose names appear on the memorial were present. However, it was also a day of celebration that, after all these years, the Winged Victory has returned home.

Winged Victory now gives a spectacular presence to Marrickville Road and is becoming a part of the fabric of the Municipality once again.
