OUR NEXT MEETING Visit to Lydham Hall

SATURDAY FEBRUARY 25, 10.30 a.m. LYDHAM HALL, 18 LYDHAM AVE. BEXLEY

Did you know that Rockdale Council has its own local Museum? It is in Lydham Hall, a beautiful sandstone house built by wealthy butcher Joseph Davis in 1860 on the highest point of land between Cooks and Georges Rivers. It is a good example of the transition from simple Georgian colonial-style architecture to the more ornate mid-Victorian pattern. We are fortunate indeed that popular historian Alderman Ron Rathbone has agreed to tell us something of the history of the house and the museum on our visit. Meet at Lydham Hall at 10.30 am but we need to know numbers beforehand. Please phone Chrys Meader (560.9333 Ext.282) or Anne Carolan (406.4862).

Lydham Hall, built in 1860, is now Rock-dale Council's local museum and we will be visiting it at our next meeting.

COMING EVENTS Underground Expedition

TANK STREAM EXCURSION SUNDAY MARCH 12th at 10.a.m.

We have booked 30 places for this expedition into underground Sydney so it is essential to book in advance through Chrys Meader at 560.9333 Ext.282. One party of 15 will depart at 10 a.m. and a second at 10.20 a.m. The tour lasts 40 minutes. It is advisable to bring a rain or spray-jacket to avoid dripping water. Apart from an eight-rung portable stairway, it is all level pegging. The meeting place for both groups is at Curtin Place off Pitt Street, next to Australia Square. Look for the prominently displayed Water Board Tank Stream Tour signs. The time of meeting is 15 minutes before your tour; 9.45 am and 10.05 am. The cost is adults \$5; pensioners \$2; children under 15, free. Since the Tank Stream is now a stormwater drain, the tour may have to be cancelled if there is heavy rain. If in doubt ring 516.2685 on the morning of the tour.

COMING EVENTS Residents Rally on Airport

AIRPORT MEETING - TUESDAY FEBRUARY 21, 7.30 p.m. MARRICKVILLE TOWN HALL.

Although much of our Suburb was built before aeroplanes were invented - Sydney's airport, its attendant industries and road traffic severely affect our present lifestyle. Tourism is now considered Australia's biggest growth industry; air traffic is increasing at the rate of 7% per year. The federal airports corporation forecasts that the present number of passengers - four million per year - will increase to 30 million by year 2010. Marrickville and other suburbs bounding Kingsford-Smith Airport will suffer disproportionately the negative side-effects of this 'growth industry'.

Marrickville Airport Watch - with the support of Marrickville Heritage Society and Resident Groups from Summer Hill, Petersham-Lewisham, Stanmore, and Sydenham-St.Peter's-Tempe - is calling a meeting to receive new information about the airport problem and to suggest solutions.

Our State Government, Liberal and National Party politicians suggest short-term solutions - e.g. encroaching further on Botany Bay and abolishing the curfew (which at least ensures five hours of sleep for residents). Most disturbing is the suggestion of another north-south runway which would channel more jumbo jets over our rooftops. You are urged to come along and participate. Speakers will include Federal M.P.s, an acoustics engineer and representatives of local residents and the Councils' Monitoring Committee.

Speaking Personally: Tempe Pioneer Remembered

ANNE CAROLAN WRITES:

I am a great great-granddaughter of Michael Gannon (See <u>Heritage</u> Nos 1 and 2) and I was invited to take part in a Bicentennial tree planting ceremony at Hurstville Public School. Michael Gannon gave two acres of land for the establishment of a public school in 1875. The district of Gannon's Forest then had 100 children. The first school was completed in 1876 for £600 and was named Hurstville Public School. The school on Forest Road (formerly Gannon's Forest Road) has vast grounds with numerous trees planted many years ago. However, more were needed at the front and I chose to take along a grevillea robusta ('Silky Oak') which should grow quickly into a very tall and beautiful tree, giving shade to the playground and attracting the native birds. The ceremony was reminiscent of Arbor Days of Now the children of the primary school are to be responsible for watering the small trees, and, hopefully, more will be planted each year.
