

## OUR NEXT MEETING A Tour of Richmond Villa

SATURDAY MAY 26, 9.15AM RICHMOND VILLA 120 KENT STREET, CITY.

All members interested in family history or any aspect of local history should come along to find out about the Society of Australian Genealogists. Established in Sydney in 1932 the society now has more than 8000 members and its extensive library contains not only books, manuscripts and pictures but also many thousands of index cards. The society's headquarters is Richmond Villa, a fascinating building with a rich history of its own. It was erected in 1849 by the Colonial Architect Mortimer Lewis, as his private home facing the Sydney Domain It was dismantled in 1976 to make way for additions to Parliament House and was rebuilt on its present site.

After visiting Richmond Villa we will walk to St Brigids school and chapel, built in 1833 and probably the oldest surviving Catholic Church property in Australia and then to the house of Michael Gannon, an early Tempe builder and inn-keeper, in Argyle Street. Tea, coffee or wine and cheese platter will be available here. Meet at 9.15AM on the footpath outside Richmond Villa, 120 Kent St, City. Walk north from Wynyard (York St) Station then along Kent St (either via Margaret St, or through the underpass near St Philips Church). The Villa is a few steps past the fire station. 
## **Airport Information Kit**

The Second Sydney Airport Coalition has produced an information kit which will be sent to politicians, councils, community groups, environmental groups and the media. The kit lists those areas affected by the proposed third runway at Kingsford Smith Airport; councils and community groups opposed to the third runway, a fact sheet and suggestions for ways in which local residents can voice their opposition. #### Stained Glass and Stone

A new book published this month - Stained Glass and Stone by Bertha MacKenzie - celebrates the grandeur and rich history of the Sydney University Gothic buildings. The buildings designed by Edmund Blacket reflected the Perpendicular Gothic style of Oxford and Cambridge Universities Built in the 1850-60s, the buildings dominated the young city with their immense size and commanding position on the hill at Grose Farm. They show a city's pride in its public buildings which we are unlikely to ever see again. This book in more than 300 photographs highlights the long forgotten skills of stained glass and wood and stone carving. The book, designed and produced by society member Mark Matheson, was printed by Marrickville company Southwood Press.
